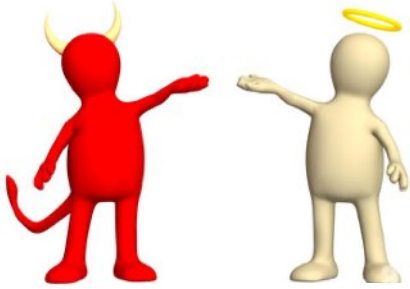


EDITOR SAYS

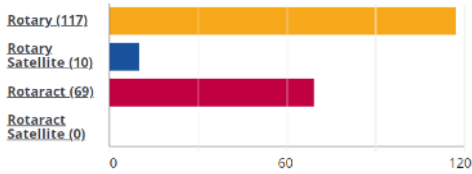

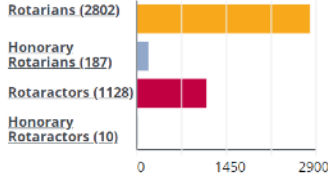

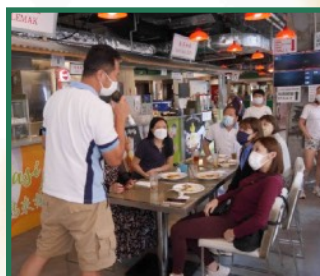

Traditionally, mid-Autumn is the time for family get together to celebrate yearly harvest. For those less fortunate and in particular, those who are homeless, they do not have family around with whom to share the full moon festival. On 11th September 2024, RC Tai Po members comprising Natalie and daughter Elizabeth, Danny, William, Wilson Woo, Peter, Jules and Dara, Sim Sim, Anthony and Mary, Claire, and Natalie's friends Steve and Ann, visited 2 centres of the Street Sleepers Shelter Society to give out goody bags and shared some festive celebration with the homeless residents there.



We learned from Warden Mr. Tang that the Street Sleepers Shelter Society is a charitable institution which provides free temporary accommodation to the homeless. They operate three shelters respectively in Wanchai, Yaumatei and Shamshuipo which are air-conditioned and equipped with basic provision comprising double-bunker beds, shared bathroom, hot water and TV. Each resident is allocated a bedspace and a cabinet, with a personal set of linen, blanket and bedsheet that he/she must look after oneself. The Society is managed by a voluntary Executive Committee and therefore there is no administrative fee. All the expenditure is for the operation of the shelters.



The inmates are rendered homeless for various reasons, including financial and family problems. Residents are on the referral from social workers or relevant authorities, and they are given a temporary shelter, and more importantly, a chance. At the time of our visit, not a lot of inmates were back to the Yaumatei centre yet; and in the Shamshuipo Centre, most inmates had gone out to a church-organized dinner. For those who were there and chatted with us, they shared their daily routines and their experiences about the shelters. All of them are appreciative that we paid them the visit and gave them the little bags of presents containing fruits, mooncakes, biscuit and cup noodles. It was festive and it was a show of care.



After the visits, RCTP members shared a tasty dinner in a Shamshuipo restaurant and had an early celebration of mid-Autumn. Most of the dishes were deep fried but they were sinfully tasty and went well with the cold beer that we cheered non-stop. Like I said at the beginning, mid-Autumn is the time for family get-together. Keeping fit and fighting calories can be for later. Cheers!





The DG's visit to Area 6 took place on 23 September 2024 at the Royal Plaza Hotel. Before the joint dinner meeting, there was a private meeting with the DG and his team. Our club was assigned the time slot of 5:15 to 5:45 PM, which was convenient for us.



Our club was represented by President Jules and six club officers/directors. President Jules introduced our club's details, service projects, and plans. The DG's team provided valuable feedback and highlighted the focus points of the District this year. We shared ideas and engaged in good interactive communication during the meeting.

I must say that we used to have a much bigger group joining (last year we have 17!) but despite the fewer participants, the fun and excitement were certainly no less than in previous years! We were glad to renew friendship with sister club and also our own baby club RC Central and RC Macau whose members were present too! And how lucky that the big typhoon which affected Taiwan ended the day we arrived and turned to 高雄; so our whole trip was not affected at all.

Day 1: 4 October Friday - Arrival

Tsubaki and Peter skipped the usual pre-event Golf this trip and we arrived in Taipei with President Jules around 11am and was greeted by old friends of RC Taipei, PP Furniture (David Lin) and PP Ampo & his wife Eva at the airport. Frankie & Creamy arrived late in the afternoon while Wilson Woo was tied up with work and ended up coming late in the evening and so had missed the welcome dinner. After checking in to hotel at The Howard Plaza Hotel (台北福華大飯店), 3 of us had a very good dumpling lunch at a small restaurant nearby. 3 of us were lucky that the hotel arranged a suite room for each of us so our rooms were very spacious and comfortable (Frankie & Wilson, were your rooms OK?!)



Day 1: 4 October Friday - Welcome Dinner for Sister Clubs and post-dinner activity

Unlike previous years, welcome dinner this time was not held in hotel but at a Michelin-starred Shanghaiese Restaurant nearby (榮榮園浙寧餐廳). There were 3 tables of guests from host RC Taipei, RC Manila, RC Singapore, RC Bangkok, RC Macau and us. Thanks to RCT PP Furniture for picking up Frankie & Creamy from airport upon their late afternoon arrival, they made it to the dinner around 7:30pm despite the heavy traffic. We all enjoyed the good food and fellowship and were glad to meet old friends from RC Macau and PP Mark Wang from Singapore, and made new friends from three prestigious old clubs. RC Taipei was represented by PE Andrew Wong, 2026-27 President Maggie Huang, and AG Ariele Chou. Our old friend PP Braces (William Choi) arrived towards the end when Peter presented to him our donation of USD500 to support their Happy Smile Vocational Training District Grant project. There were plenty of wines and whisky but we behaved well and only drank moderately!



After the welcome dinner, President Jules treated us to cocktail at the hotel bar and we waited for Wilson who arrived around 11:20 and gave him 2 beers to cheer him up. Then we moved on to late night snack 宵夜 at this popular 小李子清粥小菜餐廳 where we also came in 2019 . . . wow many dishes costing only about HK\$15-30! So cheap!



Day 2: 5 October Saturday: Local Tour

We went to 淡水 last year and this time I arranged visit to 九份 & 基隆 area and started our journey around 8:30am which took around 1 hour to arrive our first destination 黃金瀑布 & 黃金博物館. 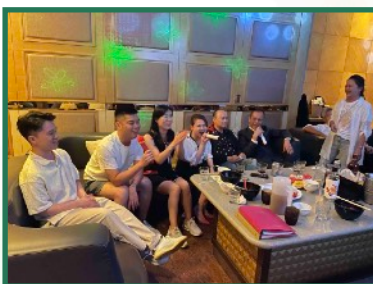


Day 2: 5 October Saturday: Rotary Club of Taipei 76th Anniversary Dinner

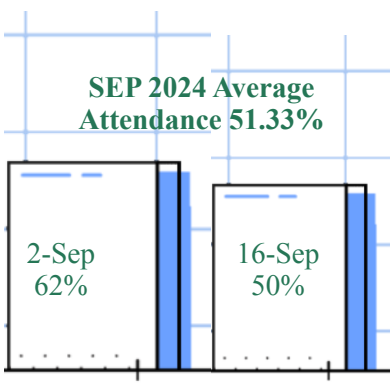
