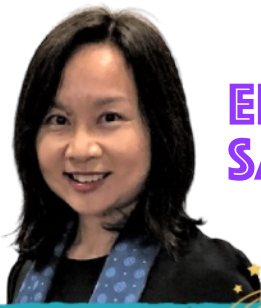

- Connect with potential project partners, both within and outside of Rotary
- Get help fundraising and obtaining resources for projects

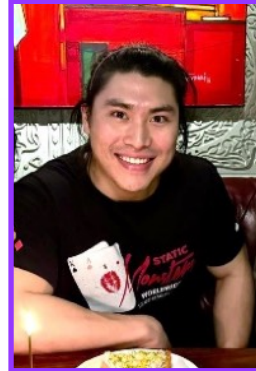

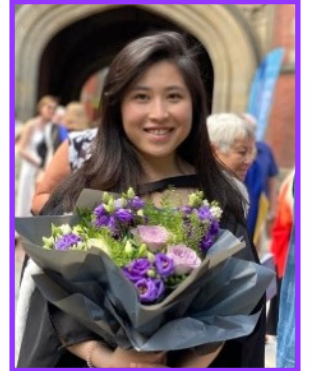

The background building and the characters remain the same, but the time has changed.



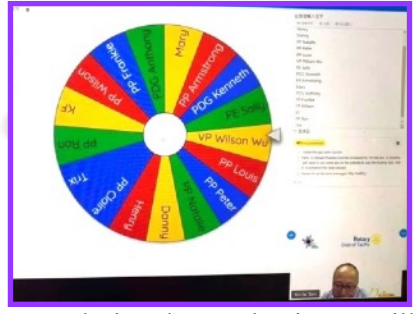
4 generations

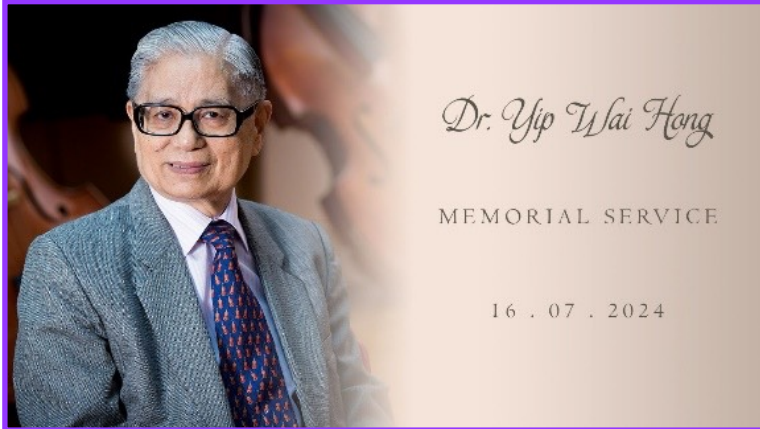

Our Dad, Dr. Yip Wai Hong, passed away on Father's Day, June 16, 2024 at age 94. He was engaged in music education for over 60 years, and was a distinguished music educator, conductor and composer.

He founded the Hong Kong Children's Choir in 1969 and was named "The Father of Children's Choir" after he helped established a number of community children's choir in local districts and churches throughout Hong Kong. He founded a semi-professional orchestra, the Pan Asia Symphony Orchestra, in 1976 to promote classical orchestral music. Later in 1983, he established the Yip's Children's Choral & Performing Arts Centre alongside Yip's Children's Choir, and in 1996, the Hong Kong Children's Symphony Orchestra. During the past 55 years, he had led his Choirs and symphony orchestras to go on numerous concert tours and participated in international music festivals, doing cultural exchange and sharing music and love with people all over the world.

Dad started off studying music at Yanjing University in Beijing but graduated from the Central Conservatory of Music, Beijing in 1955, majoring in Composition. He received his Master's of Church Music Degree from the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary in Louisville, Kentucky in 1970. He was awarded Doctor of Musical Arts degree majoring in conducting and composition from the South Western Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Texas in 1979.

Dad had deep roots and far-reaching origins with the Hong Kong Baptist University (Hong Kong Baptist College at time). He had taught at the college from 1963 - 1992. He established the Music & Fine Arts Department for the school in 1973, taking office as the Head of the department for 20 years. He became the Head of the Faculty of Arts for 4 years before his retirement in 1992.

Dad loved children. He originally wanted to have as many children as a football team, which is at least 11, but he ended up with 3 girls who show no interest in sports. But who would have known that thousands of children in Hong Kong would eventually receive his love and musical cultivation.

Dad loved to boast and be recognized, especially the children he had taught, he was always full of appreciation and praise. Whenever there were students receiving certain achievements, no matter big or small, were world champions in his mind, and he felt extremely proud of them!

Dad liked to use his brain and had always been able to adapt quickly to unpredicted situations. When he was young, he loved to play Chinese Chess and Bridge, from which he was trained to become a person who always made precise deployment for everything and remained calm in times of crisis.

My father was a very emotional and impatient person. He never hid his emotions deliberately, and his 4 emotional expressions: Joy, Anger, Sorrow and Happiness were written clearly all over his face. He would shed tears because he was reluctant to let his daughter study abroad alone; and would lose temper because others were not efficient in doing things. He would even take the initiative to shake hands with others after an unpleasant argument because he didn't like to let negative emotions bother him for too long and made himself uncomfortable.





Dad loved to joke and had a great sense of humor, so children loved to get close to him. He always told funny stories, and every former choir student of different generations will never forget the story of "The Bald Man Smoking Cigars"... A joke that had been told for fifty years and was still talked about.

Dad was a pioneer. With his hands, many things could turn from nothing to something. If something had never been done by anyone else, he would just do it if he thought it's worthwhile. He would do everything he promised and committed, and stuck to it even if he ran into obstacles here and there.



Dad loved to mentor the younger generations, giving young people opportunities to develop their talents and paving the paths for them. He also created job opportunities for mainland musicians who settled in Hong Kong in the 1970s and 1980s by arranging students for them and inviting them to play in his orchestra.

Dad was a natural salesman, eloquent and persuasive. What was he selling? It's definitely just classical music and talented musicians!

Dad loved to immerse in laughter and often needed company. What he enjoyed most was to invite people to dine and chatted while eating! No matter what he did, there would always be students or colleagues around to assist him. Of course, his loyal fan and best partner Mrs. Yip, our mother, was also indispensable.

Dad loved to eat chicken, so he had the nickname "Chicken Hong" (雞康). He said that eating chicken could cure all kinds of diseases. After every concert/performance that he conducted, he would definitely eat a meal of chicken soup. Unfortunately, due to dementia and the decline in swallowing ability in the last two years of his life, he could only be fed through the stomach with a tube inserted, and he no longer remembered the taste of chicken.

Dad's life had not been ordinary. He had experienced great turmoil in life and suffered a lot in the first half of his life, but all those had made him a stronger person and knew how to cherish every opportunity. He often said that people should "forget the past and leave unhappiness behind, work hard to move forward, and run straight to achieve their goals." He really did it. We will miss him forever.





On August 24th, The Rotary Club of Tai Po, in collaboration with Tai Po Baptist Church Social Service, organized a memorable "Wish Wagon" journey.

The "Wish Wagon" was closely linked to the 點亮飛凡獎學金計劃, a program designed to support children with Special Educational Needs (SEN) and aimed to provide encouragement and recognition to these remarkable children.

As part of this initiative, our club members offered their private cars and volunteered as drivers to take the scholarship recipients on a special local tour of Hong Kong. This journey was not only a celebration of their achievements but also an opportunity to create lasting memories and strengthen their family ties.



A special thanks to PP William for planning the itinerary and introducing the landmarks, enriching our understanding of Hong Kong's hidden stories. We were also grateful to PP Wilson Woo for inviting his brother, Danny Woo, and to PP KF Tam for bringing along his friend, Wah Gor. Viola's husband, Jason, offered his assistance as well. My wife's brother-in-law Stanley was a great help, and despite his busy schedule, Manson joined us in the morning before returning to work. His dedication was truly appreciated.



Our day began at 9:30 am as we gathered at Tai Po Fu Shin Estate. With nine families, we embarked on a delightful tour of Hong Kong. Our first destination was the scenic Fei Ngo Shan (Kowloon Peak) viewpoint. This spot was chosen because it's usually inaccessible without a car, offering a unique experience for everyone involved. During the drive, we shared stories and laughter, providing opportunity for families to strengthen bonds.



Our second stop was near the airport's maintenance area, allowing the children to see airplanes up close. This rare opportunity to take photos with planes was a thrilling experience for them. Located at the westernmost part of Chek Lap Kok Airport, this spot was new even to our Rotary Club members. Along the way, we encountered aviation enthusiasts and fishing hobbyists, adding to the lively atmosphere.



After the airplane adventure, we enjoyed lunch together at the Regal Airport Hotel, providing more time for connection and conversation. Finally, our drivers ensured each family returned home comfortably.



The day was filled with joy and excitement, especially for the children. It was a heartwarming event that reminded us of the power of community and the difference we can make together.

VISIT TO SISTER CLUB ROTARY CLUB OF MAKATI SAN LORENZO

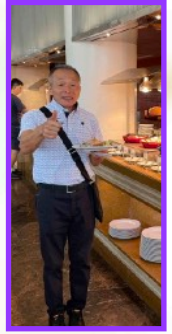

We are most pleased that new member Sim Sim could join to experience, for her first time, this international fellowship and exchange which is an important part of Rotary! Here is my account of the 2 days visit which was truly enjoyable and glad to renew our friendship with many good friends from RCMSL!

Day 1 29 Aug. arrival & lunch

Upon our arrival, we were picked up by PP Erwyn and then treated to a delicious buffet lunch at the Fairmont Makati Hotel. We tried the teppan ice cream which was interesting and tasty! Then we moved on to our Dusit Thani Hotel nearby which was nice although not as grand and luxurious as the Peninsula Hotel we used to stay . . . so I know next time it is best to stick with Peninsula and not explore new places (or maybe try Fairmont?!) After check-in, Claire tried the hotel swimming pool and I had cocktail with Tsubaki in the hotel bar before we were picked up later to attend the big function.

Carmen from RCMSL) who was from RC Alabang (our club first sister club in the Philippines (1993-2011)) and a golfer who used to play with us when we visited back then! I must say I don’t quite remember the food but it seems that the Ice Cream from the cart was most popular as it ran out quite soon!

There were of course entertainment (Musical Interlude) which include Philippines Folk Dance and ballroom dancing by PP Jamie. Day 2 30 Aug. Local Tour

Peter & Tsubaki was planning a game of golf at a public course in the city on Saturday morning but gave up the idea as a local tour to the country side was organized for us and we had to depart hotel around 9am. Buffet breakfast at our hotel was very good with great varieties including Peter's favourite Egg Benedict and they even served 豆腐花, Indian dishes and Japanese Ramen! Too bad Jules was still recovering from stomach problem from his recent trip to Mongolia and had to skip breakfast. After breakfast we were transferred to Peninsula Hotel where Rotarians from RC Taipei Capital as well Rotarians from other local clubs gathered, ready to depart.



Our first destination was a rural village area known as *Mexico Pampanga* and due to traffic, we ended up arriving at around 13:00 over 2 hours drive by bus. Thanks to a good young tour guide who explained various culture and history of Philippines and we also had some karaoke singing during our long journey started off by IPP Leigh. The main attraction was the lunch buffet at the home of a village lady (Atching Lilian Borromeo) who is famous for making cookies to sell which her family had started a long time ago dated back to Spanish rule era. We were served local dishes whose names I could hardly recall and only remember this sausage dish made from pig blood! After the meal, the village lady demonstrated to us how she has been making cookies the old traditional way by hand and Sim Sim also gave a try making one sample!



Day 2 30 Aug. Local Tour

After lunch we visited the Bacolor Church (San Guillermo Parish) which was established in 1576 but rebuilt in stone in 1886. We were amazed that this very old site still exists and that the church was in fact buried half in lahar and mud because of the Mt. Pinatubo eruption of 1991 which diminished its height to 6 meters. If not for RCMSL, I doubt normal tourists will ever get the chance to visit such historic site, big thanks to RCMSL!



The next stop was the Furniture Showroom Tour where we visited a big showroom situated in a nice countryside surrounding. The furniture on display were mainly wooden classic furniture chairs, desk, bed, closet all with very refined wooden craftsmanship and would have costed so much in Hong Kong but at very good price here. And right after this, we took a tea break at a nearby wooden pavilion and were treated to Filipino Spring Rolls "Lumpia" snacks and cold lemongrass drink, quite good!



Day 2 30 Aug. Fellowship Dinner

We ended our tour around 4:45pm and expected to return to the city in 2 hours for dinner but traffic was so bad on this Friday evening that we ended up with almost a 3-hour drive and finally arrived at our dinner venue at almost 8pm. Unlike previous years where the farewell dinner was held at some RCMSL Rotarians big home, this time the dinner was held at the Solaire Resort North which was a very modern casino hotel in Metro Manila. When we arrived, we were glad to see several RCMSL Rotarians who had not joined the tour present: PP GJ, PDG Cha Cha, Marian, PP Nikki, Johnny, Marj and few others. The buffet dinner restaurant was huge and crowded. It served unlimited wine and so much good food like lobster, roast pork, steak & pasta which was just right as we all seem a little hungry having this late dinner! Speaker Mr. Maurice Yeung is the husband of dear friend DS/PP Angela Hui of RC Hong Kong Harbour. Their presence attracted quite some attention and attendance.

President Jules gave red box for 'you know why'; while PP Danny paid happy box as he cheerfully broke the good news of his wife's pregnancy... and received overwhelming congratulations!



PP Natalie lined up our speaker and thus gave an introduction of Mr. Maurice Yeung (and wife PP Angela). PP Claire did the Vote of Thanks.



Mr. Maurice Yeung spoke to us about "Smart Window," his award-winning solution to counteract unwanted traffic noise at residential premises while at the same time maintains free airflow. Maurice started by taking us through different noise/sound levels, their measurement in decibels and causes, how Hong Kong fare against other cities in terms of traffic noise and the environmental impact. His "Thinking Out of the Box" solution, (inspired by what he read from German literature) comes like this: 2 Windows – Outer Window openable side-hung with fixed glazing on one side plus Inner sliding Window which is sound absorbent with panes facing the air gap. Maurice said these days Smart Windows are developing with better and more cost-effective materials from China and as at 2024 Q2, smart windows have been proposed to address traffic noise impacts for over 150 residential developments.



The topic is not exactly an easy one and generated questions from Wilson, Benjamin, Sim Sim, Natalie and Jules, all which Maurice answered with ease.



Lucky Claire claimed the raffle prize of a set of dumpling-shape Salt and Pepper Set and a bottle of branded Soy Sauce given out by Sim Sim.

Danny promoted the upcoming service on 11 September for gifting mooncakes to the homeless.



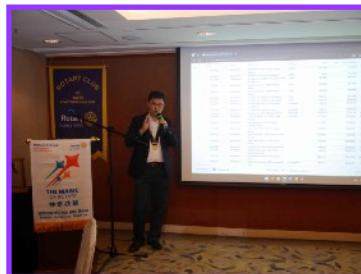
KF reported on the Wish Wagon event which took place on 24 August; and spoke about the recent observations he has from his vocation.

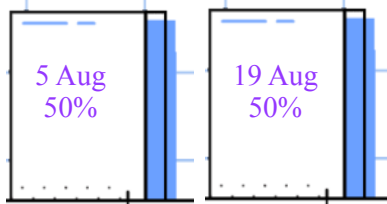
