## Bill Gates outlines final push to end polio

Bill Gates, speaking on 12 June at the Rotary International Convention, highlighted the extraordinary progress that's been made toward a polio-free world, along with challenges ahead.

Speaking at the Georgia World Congress Center in Atlanta, Georgia, USA, Gates reminded the audience of more than 22,000 attendees, who were given LED bracelets to wear, that the effort must continue and be strengthened before polio cases can be reduced to zero. Calling the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) the "single most ambitious public health effort the world has ever undertaken," Gates, co-chair of the *Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation*, reviewed the historic milestones of the fight.



Gates thanked Rotary for being the catalyst and visionary partner for ending the paralyzing disease worldwide. "Rotary laid the foundation with its unwavering sense of purpose and its belief that anything is possible if you put your mind and body to it," he said.

Since the GPEI effort began, polio cases have dropped a staggering 99.9 percent, from nearly 350,000 cases a year to only five cases reported this year, a record low. The virus has been eliminated in all but three countries: Afghanistan, Nigeria, and Pakistan. Gates noted that more than 16 million people who would otherwise have been paralyzed by polio are walking today. "The scale of this effort is phenomenal," he added.

"Polio is the thing I spend the most time on. Every day I look at my email to see if we have a new case," Gates said. "I'm very inspired to be a part of this. I'm also very humbled."



Earlier in the day, leaders from countries all over the world joined Gates and Rotary in pledging new money toward filling the \$1.5 billion gap in the funding that the GPEI estimates is needed to achieve eradication. Rotary announced that it is increasing its annual fundraising goal to \$50 million. Since the Gates Foundation and Rotary began working together in 2007, the two organizations have raised nearly \$1.5 billion for polio eradication efforts.

Gates, who said his top priority for the last decade has been ending polio, acknowledged that challenges still lie ahead, especially in areas of conflict where polio remains endemic. "One of the toughest things to do is reach all the children who need the polio vaccine," he said. "This is especially hard in conflict areas, because it is so difficult to build trust with all sides."

But Gates also noted that Afghanistan, which still has areas of conflict, is nearly free of the virus. "That's because the people running the [polio] program have helped build understanding that the only way to get rid of polio is to rise above political, religious, and social divisions." With fewer cases now than ever before, the surveillance and detection of the virus becomes more difficult. "To stop the virus completely, we have to know where it's hiding," said Gates.

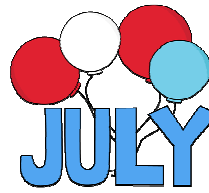
A network of 146 labs worldwide tests about 200,000 stool samples for the poliovirus every year; 99.9 percent of them are negative. But that tiny percentage of positive results will help health officials focus immunization activities to prevent the virus from spreading. In addition, in countries where polio remains endemic, 125 environmental detection sites test sewage, because the poliovirus can survive in sewage for a short time.

Innovations inspired by polio eradication efforts can now have wide-ranging benefits for other global health campaigns, Gates said. Techniques like community mapping, disease surveillance, and expanding the role of health workers will help health authorities detect and contain other infectious diseases, like Ebola.

"That is what is so exciting about Rotary's 30-year fight," Gates told the crowd. "You are not only eradicating one of the worst diseases in history. You are also helping the poorest countries provide citizens with better health and a better future."

# Korean International Service Trip

During the summer holidays, we had a meaningful service trip with the local kids in South Korea.

We were welcomed by the Nongol Community Library staff and we also lived in a flat near the library. Nongol Community is the district where we mainly did our service. There are many underprivileged kids with complicated family background. Their parents are not able to afford their afterschool activities. To prevent the kids from getting into bad company, a non-governmental organisation established a community library which provides lots of free-of-charge afterschool activities for the kids. We could see that the NGOs have put much effort and strived hard to improve the local's lives as their work responded well to the need of the underprivileged.



On one day, we painted the chairs and tables outside the library. Since the NGO is running on a limited budget, they need our help to renew the library to give the children a fresh and joyful environment when they visit the library again. We initially thought it would be easy and would not take much time, but it turned out that we spent the whole morning and half of the afternoon to finish our work. Yet, we did not feel tired or bored since we painted with the local children in the afternoon. Their participation had given us a great support and fun. From their smiley faces, we also believe that they had enjoyed the painting as well.



Apart from painting, we then visited their children centre where the children were looked after every day after school. We played games and sang English songs together, to teach them some animal names in English and to encourage them to speak more in English. They were quite attentive on our teaching, especially when we played videos. Besides, we folded paper with them to bring them fun as well as helped them revise what had taught. The children were very clever and active that they learnt folding paper quickly.





In an afternoon, we visited Namhansanseong, which is a world heritage nominated by UNESCO. We went on a hike with the children, talking with them in English all the way, to let them practise speaking English confidently in daily conversation. We found out that the English level of the children was not very good that sometimes they were not able to express some simple words like sky, spider and hungry. We kept on chatting with them since this was a valuable opportunity for them to practise English. The hike provided us a chance to get to know each other and the relationship between us and the children was drawn closer after that. This was a great time for us to build trust and friendship, and to express our love and care to them, so as to let them know they were loved and valued.



We also spent an afternoon in another children centre as well. After that, one of our participants shared with us that when she was about to leave the children centre, the kids asked when she would be back, holding her hand. She felt grief and did not know how to answer them at that moment. The kids promised her that they would study English hard. They also said that they wished to come to Hong Kong one day. She was deeply moved by their sincerity and eagerness to learn. They are born in underprivileged families and may even face some family problems, but their hearts are the softest and their minds are the purest.



Another highlight of this trip was the visit to the demilitarized zone (DMZ). It is a buffer zone between North and South Korea. In the study session at the previous night, we had discussed about what peace is and had a brief understanding on the history of the two Koreas. And this DMZ tour gave us a more detailed and realistic approach to look into the issue. There were also tanks and war crafts used in the war on display, which made us feel the intensity of the war more genuinely. We also looked at the border between the two Koreas and were able to see North Korea at Dora Observatory. We could even see the national flags of the two Koreas far far away. It shaped the hostility in a very realistic and concrete picture. Another stop was The 3rd Tunnel, which was an incomplete underground tunnel between North and South Korea with 1 mile in length dug by North Korea. We had tried to walk in it for 600 miles. The path was tiring since there was a long steep slope. The height of the tunnel was low too so we had to bow our heads to walk through it. It was hard to imagine how the soldiers managed to walk a longer journey in such a harsh environment, bearing the heavy weapon.



Words are not enough to express our happiness and fruitfulness in Korea. We all had a wonderful time in Korea. Once again, we would like to give thanks to everyone who has contributed to our service trip. Without their support and help, this service trip would not have been such a success.
