Here is a report from recent RI Board Meeting which I like to reprint here to keep us update with important RI strategic decision & plan:

RI Board reinforces strategic priorities, goals

At its November meeting, the RI Board approved a number of recommendations and actions to reinforce the priorities and goals of the RI Strategic Plan. RI President Ray Klinginsmith says the actions constituted progressive moves by the Board and represented a historic week for Rotary.

The changes, which include endorsing the concept of flexible attendance and meeting requirements and allocating US\$4 million for Public Relations Grants, are designed to keep Rotary vibrant and attractive to current members and prospective members from younger generations.



"By focusing on strategic issues throughout the week, the Board was able to reach consensus on several strategic decisions, which constitute progressive moves by the RI Board," says RI President Ray Klinginsmith.

Among other actions, the Board

- •Agreed to the concept of amending RI policy on meeting attendance, meeting options, and member termination in order to support and strengthen clubs by allowing them more flexibility. The changes will require revisions to the RI Constitution and the Standard Rotary Club Constitution in the form of legislation submitted to the 2013 Council on Legislation.
- Agreed to fund US\$4 million in PR grants annually, starting in 2011-12 for at least three years, to advance the strategic priority of enhancing public image and awareness.
- Supported the creation of an annual Rotary Citation beginning in 2012-13 that would replace future Presidential Citations. The new citation would be based on clubs achieving predetermined goals that are aligned with the clubs' and RI's strategic direction.
- · Agreed to transform RI programs to a "resource and support" model to help clubs and districts in their service efforts and advance the strategic priority of focusing and increasing humanitarian service.
- Agreed to replace the vision statement in the RI Strategic Plan with a core essence statement, which uses more contemporary language and better expresses what Rotary is and does.
- Agreed to conduct four new pilot programs -- associate member, corporate member, satellite clubs, and innovative and flexible Rotary clubs -- to promote membership diversity and improve recruitment, beginning 1 July. Two hundred clubs will be accepted for each three-year pilot.
- Encouraged districts with more than 100 clubs and over 4,000 members to split into two or three new districts as early as 1 July 2012.

The Strategic Planning Committee suggested many of the changes to help move the organization toward an emphasis on active and engaged membership.

"Rotary must change its culture from one of attendance to one of engagement," says RI Director Stuart B. Heal, chair of the Strategic Planning Committee. "It is our belief that in the next decade this must become our culture as we become more innovative and continue serving around the world."

Says Klinginsmith: "It was a historic week for Rotary."





Avenues of Service Citation for Individual Rotarians

Purpose

Eligibility

Wine Tour



Natalie's France Wine Tour 2010 - Sancerre, Chablis, Burgundy, Chateauneuf-du-pape, Bordeaux(Medoc, Sauternes), Champagne, 35+ Micheline Restaurants, tasted 200+ bottles. 5000+km driving

Lawso and I spend few weeks in France we visited 6 major wine regions:

The crisp white wines of Sancerre are perhaps the easiest to recognize in France. Due to the soil here, Sauvignon Blanc can make finer and more complex wine than anywhere else in the world. Pinot Noir is also popular in the region though rarely seen outside it. We visited Alphonse Mellot which is one of the most famous wine makers who make both red and white wine. We tasted for all the cuvee and they are surprisingly good!



One of the wine world's most underestimated treasures. Chardonnay responds bottlings appeal some much to the fine wine to its cold terroir of limestone clay with flavours no-one can reproduce in easier wine-growing conditions. Chablis is hard but not harsh, minerals, but at the same time of green hay. The best Chablis (Grand Cru and some best Premier Cru) testes important, strong, almost immortal. We join the wine festival and tasted most important growers' 2009 bottles. They are very promising.



Burgundy

Arguably the most legendary wine-producing region in France, Burgundy is our favourite wine region. With a history of wine making dating back to Roman times, the wines of Burgundy were considered second to none, and many feel similarly today. As the ancestral home of Chardonnay and Pinot Noir, it produce some of the most sought after wines in the world. The tiny amount of Romanee Conti, Chambertin, Musigny, Montrachet and Corton Charlemagne are usually kept by private collectors and never released to public.

We have tasted many great bottles in Burgundy. A few Coche Dury, Armand Rousseau and Denis Mortet are so "relatively" inexpensive there that every year to explore great wine. This year it is simply irresistible to open in Michelin restaurants

Chateauneuf-du-Pape

The renowned centrepiece of the southern Rhone. It is typically very meaty and spicy and very high alcohol level. It is best matched to game and sea food in chilli and spicy style. Chinese food are surprisingly good matched with the red and white wine in this region as well.

Each time we visit Chateauneuf-du-pape, we will visit Laurence Ferauds who own Domaine du Pegau. Her wine is highly praised by Journalist. Her limited edition



collectors and it is quite difficult to find in the market. Fortunately we can drink as much as we can while we dined at her home! Bordeaux (Medoc, Sauternes)

As Burgundy's appeal is unashamedly sensual, Bordeaux's is more cerebral. Bordeaux great glories are its finest red wines (the world's archetypes for blends of Cabernet and Merlot), and the tiny production of very sweet, golden Sauternes which can live even longer.

Bordeaux is a name without the need to introduce. But not all Bordeaux is glorious; the region is too big. How big? The core region (from St-Estephe to Sauternes) is about the same distance from Hong Kong to Guangzhou.

In Medoc, we visited Lafite, Margaux, Haut Brion and many other chateaux. We tasted their 199x as well as 2009 barrel samples (the 2009s are expected to be sky-high priced).









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Sauternes wine is potentially one of the world's longest-living wines. It depends on local conditions and on a very unusual fungus and winemaking technique. In great vintages the results can be sublime: a very sweet, richtextured, flower-scented, glittering golden liquid.

Champagne

French Champagne is irrefutably the finest sparkling wine in the world. In terms of quality, no other wine-producing region can compete. It is Champagne that stands alone at the top of the qualitative pyramid for sparkling wines.

There are about 20,000 growers in champagne. Less than 9% of all planted vineyard land in Champagne have received the Grand Crus rating. It is quite challenging to find a reasonably priced Grand Cru champagne!





"The Sake For Winter"

This winter is coming so late. Somehow, it is a good seafood's season for Japanese hot pot "Nabe". Fine things complement each other. Good food and good drinks are wonderful things and have the captivating ability to combine to produce far more than the sum of their parts. Some combinations work better than others. The matched kinds of Nabe are usually served with oyster, crab, codfish, anglerfish, Tofu, Hokkaido salmon fish etc. Neverthless, my favourite is Sukiyaki and Suppon Marunabe.

It's is always a good idea to think about temperature when drinking sake, and when thinking about food matches, the same rule applies. Actually, there is a wide range of temperatures to enjoy sake. It is a matter of sake - serving style. Nowadays sake is often designed and brewed based on serving styles: warm, ambient or cold. It is also related to food pairing. Sake is likely the **only** alcoholic beverage served at various temperatures. In warming sake, taste may vary depending on warming time and the method of warming. Sake with a well-balanced taste can be warmed in warm water until anticipated warmness or temperature. Keep in mind that within every bottle of sake, there are flavours that do different things at different degrees of heat or coldness, and there's an appropriate Japanese term for the entire range.



Warming Terms and Temperatures

Sunny Ambient Warm around 30c (86F)

Body Temperature around 35c (95F)

Tender Warm around 40c (104F)

Warm around 45c (113F)

Hot around 50c (122F)

Super Hot around 55c (131F) or more

Finally, you just have to know which sakes are better for heating and which sakes are better for drinking cold. And the best way to heat your sake is to bring a half-filled pan of water to boil, add your tapered sake vessel (Tokkuri) or a mug, and then keep it into the water after turn off the flame. Just around two minutes, you could

enjoy the warmth sake. But caution: please don't use the microwave to harm the Sake!



Over 300 Rotaractors from Taiwan, Australia, Philippines, Malaysia, and Indonesia etc flocked to the Olympic Park for a series of workshops, sharing sessions and fun. This year we had several heavy-weight guests in APRRC such as Haris Sofradsija, the Youth Activities Coordinator of RI. Ramesh Ferris, an Indian-born Canadian Rotarian who was infected by polio, was invited as keynote speaker to share with us how he tackled the illness from a young age, his involvement in Rotary End-polio project and the "Cycle to Walk" project in 2008 which he rode on a specially designed bicycle for over 7000km across Canada to raise public awareness

towards polio.

One key agenda of APPRC was the formation of Asia Pacific Multi-district Information Organisation (MDIO). Similar to the European Rotaract Information Centre (ERIC), Asia Pacific MDIO aims to provide a platform for facilitating inter-district communication and cross-district projects. A work group will be in force next year for legitimising the organisation in RI. Besides packed conference programme, we also had a great time in activities like traditional Australian bush dance, Sydney Harbour boat trip and Cultural Night. Not only had I made a bunch of new friends from different countries through APRRC, I also gained a broader scope towards Rotaract worldwide. I would recommend my fellow Rotaractors to join the 8th APRRC next year in Subic Bay, Philippines from September 29 to October 2.


